> Irrigated Farmland to Urban Land

There were no conversions of irrigated farmland to urban land this update.

➤ Grazing or Other Land to Urban Land

This update there were two instances of grazing or other land changing to urban land. In the Community of Bootjack, the Mariposa Self Storage facility and some homes were added (\approx 10 acres) as well as some businesses (\approx 10 acres).

> Irrigated Farmland to Grazing Land

There were three conversions of irrigated farmland to grazing land this update. These changes were due to farmland that had been fallow for three update cycles. These changes occurred on the Ben Hur (\approx 30 acres), Mariposa (\approx 15 acres), and Stumpfield Mountain (\approx 15 acres) quads.

> Irrigated Farmland to Other Land

There were no conversions of irrigated farmland to other land this update.

➤ Grazing or Other Land to Irrigated Farmland

This update there was one instance of newly irrigated farmland. A small vineyard (approximately 10 acres) was added on the Bear Valley quad.

➢ Grazing Land to Other Land

There were 57 conversions of grazing land to other land this update. The majority of these changes were due to the addition of low-density housing (ranchettes) throughout the county. Large conversions (100 acres or larger) occurred on the Mariposa (4 instances) quad and the Stumpfield Mountain (1 instance) quad. The other changes were due to small water bodies (less than 40 acres) and a couple of small dirt runways (≈35 and 10 acres).
